



## Visa Classifications

Nonpermanent Resident Aliens are individuals seeking temporary entry to the U.S. for a specific purpose, business or pleasure. This group may include intra-company transferees, temporary workers/trainees, visitors for business or pleasure, students, etc. Various types of visa classification documentation will apply. All non-permanent resident aliens must provide evidence of a valid, acceptable visa. A copy of the unexpired visa must be included in the loan file evidencing one of the following visa classes common non-immigrant visa classifications are:

Public Interest Parole (PIP)	An alien paroled into the U.S. temporarily for emergency reasons or reasons deemed strictly in the public interest.		X
Temporary Protected Status (TPS)	An alien who has applied for temporary protected status. Employment Authorization Document references category A-12	X*	
Border Crossing Card (BCC)	A card issued by INS to Mexican citizens to enter the U.S. for a special period of time.		X
DACA	Employment Authorization Document references category C-33	X* FNMA and FHA Only	X FHLMC VA USDA

\*FNMA: EAD must be current at time of closing. If the income type requires 3-year continuance the loan is not eligible. FHLMC/VA/FHA/USDA: All income types must document an expected 3-year continuance. If there is a termination of the TPS within 3 years of closing, loan is not eligible. Applicants possessing diplomatic status are ineligible. All borrowers must have valid and verifiable Social Security Numbers. Other forms of taxpayer identification are not allowed.
